Course Description

SPAN 310 focuses on developing writing skills through a detailed study of grammar, beginning with pronouns, focusing on verb conjugations in multiple tenses, and exploring nouns, adjectives and prepositions. SPAN 310 is a writing intensive class which is defined as writing 4,000 words or approximately 16 pages in Spanish with revisions.

Prerequisite

Completion of SPAN 250 at Winthrop University or instructor permission.

Course Credit

SPAN 310: Advanced Grammar and Composition I is an AP-weighted, dual credit accrual course. Students earn one Carnegie unit of high school credit and three hours of transferrable college credit upon successful completion of the course.

Students at Rock Hill High School receive college credit through Winthrop University. Students complete the Pre-College Application to be registered for the course and receive a college ID.

The course is a three-hour (credit) course and *may* be transferred to a college or university either in S.C. or out-of-state. Each college and university have a different protocol for how they will determine how many credits will transfer as well as whether they will count toward your major or general education requirements. Grammar Practice



Your homework consists of applying the grammar concepts talked about in the previous class and preparing for the next class. Please

- i. review your notes and/or book readings from the previous class,
- ii. complete the assigned grammar activities in your notebook,
- iii. correct your work in a different color and then,
- iv. complete the assigned readings for the next class.

Homework is graded on completion and self-correction. Full credit is earned by completing **all** sections and self-correcting **all** sections in a color different from the completion color. Homework will be checked in the LLC and will be collected and recorded the day of each test.

Journal

You will write in your Spanish journal the days you are in the LLC. Please select from one of the prompts found on Blackboard. Each journal entry should include

- 200 double-spaced words
- 2-4 paragraphs
- The grammar concept of the section

After you have completed your journal entry

- Ask Chatgpt ¿Corriges mi español?
- Copy and paste the first 100 words into ChatGPT.
- Copy and paste the revised version in your journal.
- Highlight all the changes ChatGPT made.
- Repeat for the second half of your journal.

Journals are graded on completion and corrections. You earn full credit when you complete all the instructions.

FERPA

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) (20 U.S.C. § 1232g; 34 CFR Part 99) is a Federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. The law applies to all schools that receive funds under an applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education.

FERPA gives parents certain rights with respect to their children's education records. These rights transfer to the student when he or she reaches the age of 18 or attends a school beyond the high school level. Students to whom the rights have transferred are "eligible students."

- Eligible students have the right to inspect and review the student's education records maintained by the school. Schools are not required to provide copies of records unless, for reasons such as great distance, it is impossible for parents or eligible students to review the records. Schools may charge a fee for copies.
- Eligible students have the right to request that a school correct records which they believe to be inaccurate or misleading. If the school decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student then has the right to a formal hearing. After the hearing, if the school still decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student has the right to place a statement with the record setting forth his or her view about the contested information.
- Generally, schools must have written permission from the eligible student in order to release any information from a student's education record. However, FERPA allows schools to disclose those

records, without consent, to the following parties or under the following conditions (34 CFR § 99.31):

- o School officials with legitimate educational interest;
- Other schools to which a student is transferring;
- o Specified officials for audit or evaluation purposes;
- o Appropriate parties in connection with financial aid to a student;
- o Organizations conducting certain studies for or on behalf of the school;
- o Accrediting organizations
- o To comply with a judicial order or lawfully issued subpoena;
- o Appropriate officials in cases of health and safety emergencies; and
- O State and local authorities, within a juvenile justice system, pursuant to specific State law.
