RI Lee is a multi-faceted dance artist. He is an international performer and award-winning choreographer, as well as a researcher and instructor. The emerging choreographer has presented work across the Metro-Charlotte area including Winthrop University, Loose Leaves Legacy, the SOURCE Convention (Awarded Best In SOURCE), the BOOM Festival, and most recently for Baran Dance University Extension Company's Winter Worx (2024). He joined Baran Dance in 2023 (BDU) and is currently within his second full season with the company. With Baran Dance, he has had the privilege of dancing for Bombadil's Moving Colors Tour, Winter Worx (2023), and Homegrown (2024). At Winthrop he has performed consecutively in spring, fall, and various choreographic showcases, as well as the SOURCE Convention (2022), and The American Collegiate Dance Association (2022, 2023). He has performed *Prato* in Sorrento, Italy, under Staibdance for David Dorfman as a part of the Emerging Artist Program, as well as for Martha Connerton Kinetic Works, restaging Adrift for The North Carolina Choreographers Residency Project (2024). Recently, he has performed in and served as the production intern for Cure8 Charlotte. He is an instructor at Dance Carolina Waxhaw, offering contemporary classes, solos/duets/trios, and private lessons. He is set to graduate with a B.A. in dance from Winthrop in spring '25, where his full evening-length work, *Moments of Icarus* is set to be produced in February.



Czar O'Neal is pursuing his B.A. in dance with a minor in arts management at Winthrop and hails from Winnsboro, South Carolina. O'Neal started dancing in his sophomore year of high school and has trained diligently to get to where he is now. He has performed in multiple high school football and basketball games before finally entering into the competition circuit.
